

- 1. Why does your jurisdiction need more time to meet the 50% goal? Describe why SRRE selected programs did not achieve 50% diversion. Identify barriers to meeting the 50% goal and briefly indicate how they will be overcome.**

The City implemented a fully automated residential curbside recycling program in July 1999. Each residence received three bins: green waste, commingled recyclables, and other waste. The City had anticipated that this system would greatly increase the annual diversion rate, possibly achieving 50% by 2000. Unfamiliar with the importance of source separation, Bell residents improperly, or failed completely to separate greenwaste, recyclables, and other trash. This resulted in contaminated bins. Thus, the City requires additional time to meet the 50% diversion goal by implementing additional community-wide source separation bilingual education programs to instruct residents on proper separation and disposal methods.

Additionally, the City wishes to make a concerted effort to expand and implement source separation programs that encourage voluntary participation among the City's commercial and industrial sectors. Programs may include waste audits and technical assistance among the City's top twenty industrial and commercial users. Also, waste recycling disposal information will be disseminated through the City's Planning and Building Department to contractors obtaining construction and demolition permits. The City will also consider transporting waste to the City of Commerce waste-to-energy transformation facility.

- 2. Why does your jurisdiction need the amount of time requested? Describe any relevant circumstances in the jurisdiction that contribute to the need for a Time Extension.**

The City will require the two year time extension in order to fully examine existing programs, assess program strengths and weaknesses and, where applicable, implement corrective action. Principally, the City will expand waste diversion programs among the non-residential sector. The City, effective February 2002, implemented a new greenwaste program within its own parks and recreation division. City contract landscapers separate all greenwaste at the City Yard for composting and re-use. New programs planned for the next twelve months include on-site waste diversion audits and technical assistance among the City's top twenty industrial and commercial consumers to improve source separation and recycling. The Bell Chamber of Commerce will also serve as an outreach vehicle to educate and encourage businesses to source separate. Specific Chamber of Commerce outreach efforts to the business community will include waste diversion presentations at Chamber events, and possibly incentive programs such as an annual waste diversion award for a local business that implements a successful on-site recycling program. The City will also improve information distribution among building contractors obtaining construction and demolition permits. At the time of permit issuance, the City's Planning and Building Department staff will encourage contractors to use the City's commercial waste hauler to dispose of recyclable construction materials. The City will also investigate the feasibility of assisting commercial consumers that lack sufficient on-site space for source separation to take materials to the City of Commerce waste-to-energy transformation facility. Finally, the City will request technical assistance from the CIWMB Local Assistance staff to guide us through the assessment and implementation phases.

- 3. Describe your jurisdiction's Good Faith Efforts to implement the programs in its SRRE.**

Current diversion rate is 38%. The City expanded the following programs and raised diversion from 31% in 1999 to 38% in 2000.

**Weekly Residential Automated Waste Collection:** The City's weekly residential waste collection program is fully automated and source separated. Each single-family residence possesses three waste collection bins. A 64-gallon bin is for comingled recyclables (glass, aluminum and paper); 32 gallon for greenwaste, and 96 gallon for non-recyclable trash.

The City's waste diversion outreach activities and public information dissemination continues to increase by 20-30% annually. The City sponsors two to three public information booths annually at various community events promoting waste diversion. Staff are available to distribute recycling literature and promotional items (approximately 500 pieces per event) as well as offer proper source separation and recycling techniques. Four waste diversion presentations are made annually at Citywide events including Family Film Nights, Concerts-in-the-Park series, sports league banquets, and City Council meetings. The City's Bell Family Guide, the City's bi-lingual community publication, regularly includes source reduction information. The Bell Family Guide is mailed quarterly to more than 12,000 Bell households. More than 6,000 pieces of bi-lingual literature and promotional items (tee-shirts, pencils, bookmarks) were distributed since January 2001 at three Bell area elementary schools as part of a joint elementary school/City waste diversion bingual education program.

It is vital to understand that the City of Bell, as well as several neighboring communities, lie within one of the most impoverished sections of the State. The City's predominately Hispanic, low income residential population face significant daily challenges such as obtaining food, maintaining shelter, and employment. These basic needs and priorities often, justifiably, overshadow participation in government-mandated programs. Only through methodical, community-wide planning and educational methods will the City of Bell be successful in encouraging participation in waste diversion. The CIWMB must recognize that cities, like Bell, have greater success in the community by conducting bingual public education and outreach efforts through schools, youth sports, afterschool programs, and articles published in the City's quarterly, "Family Guide".

However, if granted the time extension, the City will expand specific diversion programs among commercial and industrial users to increase participation in City-wide waste diversion programs and boost the City's diversion rate. These programs will include: on-site audits of the City's top twenty commercial and industrial users to encourage voluntary source separation; outreach through the Bell Chamber of Commerce to local businesses to encourage recycling including an annual award to a Bell business that implements a successful on-site recycling program; request contractors obtaining permits to source separate demolition and construction debris and contact the City's waste hauler for proper removal; educate the City's food waste generators on available methods to recover and reuse food waste; and, investigate the economic feasibility of hauling to the local (City of Commerce) waste-to-energy facility.
