

1. Why does your jurisdiction need more time to meet the 50% goal? Describe why SRRE selected programs did not achieve 50% diversion. Identify barriers to meeting the 50% goal and briefly indicate how they will be overcome.

The City of Rancho Cucamonga was well on its way to meeting the 50% diversion with a 45% diversion rate in 1999. We had implemented all of the programs that we felt were needed to meet and continue the 50% diversion rate. In 1999 one of our three franchised haulers sold to another franchised hauler in the community. We depend on the haulers to provide waste stream/recycling reports on a monthly basis. In the transition many of the reports were inaccurate or missing. We have resolved part of this problem and are working on the rest.

With the up swing in the economy development in Rancho Cucamonga has grown faster than anticipated. Roll-off service was not tracked separately as a part of the current system. Our growth is an issue at this point and we need to re-evaluate our programs and focus on the commercial/industrial sector as well as residential areas.

2. Why does your jurisdiction need the amount of time requested? Describe any relevant circumstances in the jurisdiction that contribute to the need for a Time Extension.

The City of Rancho Cucamonga had not anticipated the need for a time extension due to a progressive increase in our diversion rate. With a 45% in 1999 the City of Rancho Cucamonga felt they would meet the 50% or be very close by 2000. We are now asking for a 3 year time extension due to an unforeseen increase in waste stream numbers. We are evaluating our programs and will institute additional programs to meet the requirements.

In late 1999 the City's major waste hauler sold to a secondary hauler in the City. Burrtec Waste Industries spent most of 2000 resolving deficiencies in customer billing. During 2001 we implemented an automated trash collection program which brought to light many more customers not on service.

During 1999 and 2000 the City of Rancho Cucamonga's growth was (and still is) soaring. This included 5% growth in single family residents and a 10% growth commercial building. Our residential and commercial waste stream seemed to be staying consistent with growth in the community. However, it suddenly took a jump in 2000.

In 2000 an increase of 24,101 ton increase in waste was not noted until the fourth quarter. Projections did not indicate this growth. The indications are the growth is in commercial waste and construction roll-off service. We are making adjustments to this area and will more closely track these areas in the future.

3. Describe your jurisdiction's Good Faith Efforts to implement the programs in its SRRE.

The City of Rancho Cucamonga has implemented all the programs that would divert waste from the landfill in conjunction with our SRRE. A private owned MRF/Transfer station was built close to the City of Rancho Cucamonga city limits. Our franchised waste haulers are delivering green waste to a MRF/Transfer station and then it is sent to a compost facilities within the County of San Bernardino.

We implemented curbside recycling and greenwaste programs in 1993 and 1995 respectively. Our curbside set-out rate for recyclables has been over 80% since the program began. We have a PHHWCF which services over 3,200 residents per year plus we began a Home-Generated Sharps Collection program in 1996, diverting over a 100,000 sharps from the landfill per year.

We have opened an "Environmental Learning Center" for the students in Rancho Cucamonga. We provide a three hour program that emphasis natural resource conservation through reducing, reusing and recycling. We also go to school and events to promote the 3R's. We developed a brochure "Everything You wanted to Know About recycling But Where Afraid to Ask" that was mailed to all residential units and provide to new customers. We have worked with the County of San Bernardino on a Grasscycling and Greenwaste education program through a grant for the State of California.

Our Public Works Division has set a standard to divert as much material from the landfill. We have been grasscycling, mulching and sending asphalt/concrete to be processed for several years. Our landfilled waste and costs have been cut by 90% since 1994. We have been reducing waste in landscaped areas by reducing grass and ornamental shrubs needing constant trimming.

In 1999 most of the City's waste was being taken to a new MRF/Transfer station. Currently, we are questioning the reports generated by the transfer station as to where the material has come from. If we working on reviewing specific waste streams and will develop a program to reduce this waste. We are in the process of re-evaluating our programs to target all areas of diversion. This will start with a construction and demolition, and commercial diversion programs.

Commercial On-site Pickup 2030-RC-OSP	Expand	A program that has just started in cooperation with the West Valley MRF is to provide a white/computer printout paper cart for interested businesses as a buy back program. This program is designed for small businesses or businesses in large complexes. Currently there are 16 businesses taking advantage of this program diverting 3200 pounds of paper per week. A survey of the business community to determine the number of applicable businesses is currently being conducted. Completed by August 31, 2002.	Franchise Fee	9/2003	2%
School Recycling 2050-RC-SCH	Expand	Our program for Elementry Schools is to provide a three yard white recycle bin is placed in the school's enclosure. The office and classroom are given a 8 or 16 gallon recycle bin for mixed paper. A student body group picks up the bins a least twice a week or more and puts the material in the recycle bin. The Middle School program combines recycling paper, plastics, aluminum cans and greenwaste. One particular school also has a community garden that provides some food to the cafeteria. Beginning July 1, 2002 Alta Loma School District with 10 campuses will start on a paper recycling program. In the current program only a few schools are participating and generating approximately 600 pounds of mixed paper per week or approximetly 12 tons of paper per year. We will institute a permit fee, monitoring and data collection regarding where and how much material is recycle or reused on or off site. If the contractor reaches a specific percentage the permit fee will be refunded. We are developing a brochure that lists C&D recycle sites within a 25 minute drive of the City of Rancho Cucamonga. We want to make C&D recycling convient to the contractor. Estimates are we have approximately 27,000 tons of C&D that is currently going to landfills and not to various recycling center or material that could be reused such as pavement grindings.
