

1. Why does your jurisdiction need more time to meet the 50% goal? Describe why SRRE selected programs did not achieve 50% diversion. Identify barriers to meeting the 50% goal and briefly indicate how they will be overcome.

The City planned to meet the 50% diversion goal by 2000, however, the City shows a diversion of 45% for 2000. The City implemented programs identified in its SRRE and those programs have resulted in a 45% diversion rate. The City has implemented programs which divert materials from the residential and commercial sectors and is looking to further enhance and develop programs to meet the 50% goal. These programs include the expansion of MRF diversion, commercial recycling collection and the diversion of sewage sludge.

Originally, sewage sludge was not counted as part of Roseville's waste stream (from the Regional Dry Creek Wastewater Treatment Plant) and was added into Roseville base year waste stream in 1999. By adding bio-solid sludge back into Roseville's waste stream, an additional 16,000 tons was credited to Roseville's waste stream that a program had not been planned for (approximately 10% of Roseville's total waste stream). A pilot program was started in 1999 to dry sludge on a pad at the WWTP to reduce the amount of tonnage as well as saving in disposal fees. In 2002, an additional pad is being added so that a maximum effort can be put into drying during a typical drying season (from April/May to September/October). The dried sludge is then taken to the Western Regional Sanitary Landfill and used for ADC. An additional 5% diversion will be attained through the seasonal drying of sludge and use as ADC.

Also, contract modifications have been completed with the Materials Recovery Facility operator that will require the operator to achieve additional diversion of 2% effective July 1, 2002 and then an additional 2% diversion effective July 1, 2003, which will achieve a total increase of 4% diversion from the MRF. The first full year that the additional 4% diversion will be realized will be calendar year 2004.

Expansion of commercial cardboard and glass collection is projected to divert an additional 2% of the City's waste stream. The program will be promoted through staff contacting businesses and informing them as to how they can save money and help recycling efforts by their participation in the City recycling programs.

2. Why does your jurisdiction need the amount of time requested? Describe any relevant circumstances in the jurisdiction that contribute to the need for a Time Extension.

2003 will be the first full year of sludge drying acknowledging that adjustments will have to be made to the program to run it properly, leaving 2004 as the first full year of operation for sludge drying/ADC production and diversion measurement. Also, an expansion of the Materials Recovery Facility contract to increase the amount of diversion starts July 1, 2002 with an increase of 2%. Starting July 1, 2003, the required diversion percentage will be increased an additional 2%. The first full calendar year that the member jurisdictions will realize the full 4% diversion increase will be 2004.

3. Describe your jurisdiction's Good Faith Efforts to implement the programs in its SRRE.

The original SRRE identified programs that Roseville would follow (programs include partnership through the Western Placer Waste Management Authority in the design, construction and operation of a Regional Materials Recovery Facility, a newspaper drop-off program, cardboard drop-off program, public outreach and education on recycling, commercial cardboard collection, etc.) which have been implemented. Expansion of existing commercial cardboard and glass collection is currently in process which is expected to generate an additional 2-3% diversion. In all cases, Roseville has demonstrated good faith effort in our SRRE programs. A diversion rate of 45% was still attained for 2000, after absorbing a 10% increase (bio-solid sludge) to Roseville's waste stream in 1999.

During 2001, a backyard composting program was started which is supplying composting bins to residents of Roseville free of charge along with educational material to instruct the resident as to how to properly run a backyard composter. The first advertisements and public notices were well received resulting in the issuing of over 200 bins during the first month of the program.

The City of Roseville has concerns with the Disposal Report System from out of county disposal facilities. Roseville continues to be allocated waste from Forward, Inc. landfill which has shown small amounts in the past on an annual basis, but is currently showing a greatly increased amount of tonnage annually from Roseville. However, the City has not been able to verify the accuracy of their data, such as obtaining weight slips, or names of hauling companies, to ensure that the allocation is for waste actually generated within Roseville.

It has been found that a great deal of asphalt and concrete have been recycled at Roseville Aggregate over the past several years. In 1999, Roseville Aggregate has informed the City that 147,890 tons of concrete and asphalt were recycled by their business that came from within Roseville City limits. Also, in 2000, 109,230 tons of concrete and asphalt were recycled that had been delivered to their business and recycled that Roseville can be credited with.

1030-SR-PMT	New	The purchase of rubberized asphalt was started in Roseville during 2001. Rubberized asphalt is now required, per City bid specifications, for all major overlay street maintenance projects beginning in fiscal year 2002-2003. Rubberized asphalt contains approximately 20% recycled crumb rubber from scrap tires. It is estimated that it takes 200 tires to make a ton of crumb rubber. Major overlay projects in Roseville for fiscal year 2002-2003 will use 10,000 to 15,000 tons of rubberized asphalt which will recycle 2,000,000 to 3,000,000 tires.	December 31, 2003
