



- 1. Why does your jurisdiction need more time to meet the 50% goal? Describe why SRRE selected programs did not achieve 50% diversion. Identify barriers to meeting the 50% goal and briefly indicate how they will be overcome.**

The City of Oroville achieved an approximate 41% diversion rate in 2000. The city has, in great part, achieved the diversion through a franchised MRF operated by Norcal Waste Systems of Butte County, Inc(NWSBC). In addition, for the most part, the City has successfully implemented its selected SRRE programs. The implementation of the C&D processing and pilot office paper pick up were highlights as of recently. HHW exchange programs are meeting with success also as well as procurement and in-office diversion thru double sided copying and elimination of disposable drink cups to name a few. The quick turnaround implementation of CRT recovery has also yielded diversion. The annual Coats for the Community program has pulled almost 600 coats annually for cleaning and distribution. There have been the following barriers to achieving the 50% diversion rate:

Cost/Technology. The MRF for the most part has helped the City of Oroville to contribute to the 25% goal, but has hit a ceiling in hitting the 50% requirement. Currently all materials are handsorted which is not as efficient and/or effective as mechanical/automated methods. Staff of 6 to 8 workers currently manual sort materials out of the waste stream which passes by on a conveyor. The recently added C&D processing is completed with the use of a loader separating incoming boxes so that ground crews can pull both clean wood for co-generation while dirty wood (nails, etc.) is pulled for conversion to ADC. It is manual labor intensive, but effective. In addition, the processing of waste lends to contamination and loss of recyclables. The City of Oroville and NWSBC will look at future MRF enhancements both this year and in the next several to increase recovery and reduce loss to contamination.

Construction and demolition. There has been a steady increase in the processing of the city's construction and demolition waste streams as well as the desire of contractors to avoid processing costs by hauling out of the city. Enforcement of the existing city ordinance requiring all waste and demolition material will be stepped up as part of the permit process. In addition staffing and other plans at the MRF will improve this area as will be discussed in the Plan of Correction.

Schools. 3 years ago the Oroville School Districts put their waste streams out for bid effectively removing themselves from the cost structure of the City Franchise hauler NWSBC. Citing costs, the school systems took themselves out of the recycling loop. The City and NWSBC will approach the schools and bring them back into the program.

- 2. Why does your jurisdiction need the amount of time requested? Describe any relevant circumstances in the jurisdiction that contribute to the need for a Time Extension.**

The City of Oroville believes it has shown a good faith effort towards achieving the 50% diversion requirement. A 3 year time extension would allow the the City to realize increased diversion as a direct result of implementing several important programs as outlined in the Plan of Correction. The most impact driven programs will be the implementation of a curbside recycling program and C & D processing increases. The City needs time to negotiate the program with the franchise hauler and allow the hauler to budget the costs and implementation.

3. Describe your jurisdiction's Good Faith Efforts to implement the programs in its SRRE.

The City of Oroville working with staff and the franchise hauler NWSBC, has successfully implemented nearly all programs selected in its SRRE. The list includes but is not limited to: reused oil procurement for the city fleet, award and recognition of successful recycling in the community, the city has expanded into residential greenwaste collection, HHW exchange programs, C&D recycling and is adding and expanding ADC programs as well as commercial office paper collection programs and CRT collection and recycling. In addition special collection programs such as Christmas trees and clothing drives have been successfully implemented and carried out in cooperation with local civic and community groups and covered in the media in an effort to reach 50% diversion.

The current diversion rate has been achieved primarily through the franchise agreement with NWSBC and the MRF that NWSBC operates. The City is confident that the programs outlined in the Plan of Correction will achieve 50% diversion requirement.
