

1. Why does your jurisdiction need more time to meet the 50% goal? Describe why SRRE selected programs did not achieve 50% diversion. Identify barriers to meeting the 50% goal and briefly indicate how they will be overcome.

The City of Calexico's diversion rate history has been inconsistent despite the fact that several programs were implemented since 1995. Our diversion rate was 37% in 1995, 35% in 1996, no rate in 1997 and 1998, 5% in 1999, and -5% in 2000. This was the major indicator in establishing a new base year, which was completed during 2002 for the year 2000. The diversion rate originally submitted on the new base year was in excess of 50%. However, after the verification visits, the CIWMB staff were able to authenticate only 31%.

Another issue which caused delay in effectively and efficiently managing our programs and projects is personnel. The Imperial valley Waste Management Task Force, of which the city of Calexico is a member, hired a consultant to develop the SRRE programs and projects in 1998. The consultant was retained to coordinate efforts to reach our diversion requirements. After evaluating the time and cost associated with a part-time consultant who was unavailable on a continuous basis, the IVWMTF decided to fund full time positions dedicated to the development of programs included in the 1992 SRRE plan. Consequently, the Consultant was released, and the local jurisdictions appointed the City of El Centro as lead administrator of the Imperial Valley Waste Management Task Force. The Task Force hired full time staff in January 2002.

While these barriers have caused delays in implementing efficient and effective programs and projects, the IVWMTF and the City of Calexico have succeeded in hiring full time with support services. The City of Calexico has also established contacts who are responsive to the need for developing our diversion programs. We have developed excellent working relationships with CIWMB staff who have provided training on several occasions.

We have developed a web page to advertise the opportunities for recycling. We are building a database of businesses for contacting major recyclers in the Imperial Valley. We have successful on-going Earth Day Festivals.

In June of 1999 the City of Calexico, along with most Cities in the Imperial Valley, had their trash hauling contracts assigned to Allied Waste Industries. While the previous trash hauler focused on the entire solid waste disposal plan, Allied Waste Industries did not incorporate that philosophy. During the past year the Task Force has continued to work with Allied not only to understand the local philosophy but also the state's mandate of a 50% diversion rate. This has cost the IVWMTF time and effort that could have been used to manage programs. As of 2002 a new operator is in charge of the Materials Recovery Facility. The new operator is experienced in recycling, and we expect significantly better results in our curbside recycling program.

We have hired Charles Tenborg of EcoSolutions to manage and operate the HHW facility. We are currently discussing the establishment of a composting facility for diversion of greenwaste. The City of Calexico is also the site of several Certified Used Oil Collection Facilities.

The City of Calexico is also involved in implementing a construction and deconstruction recycling ordinance that we feel will have a large impact on our diversion rate as our city has several building projects in the planning stages.

2. Why does your jurisdiction need the amount of time requested? Describe any relevant circumstances in the jurisdiction that contribute to the need for a Time Extension.

The City of Calexico needs two years to meet the diversion requirements because:
The development of a C & D ordinance requires buy-in from stakeholders as well as legal review. We believe that this is the area that will provide the most benefit towards meeting the diversion requirements.
The re-allocation of staff time to resource reduction, reuse, and recycling activities will require time for contacts, development of materials, purchase of additional supplies, and training.

3. Describe your jurisdiction's Good Faith Efforts to Implement the programs in its SRRE.

In 1992 the City of Calexico adopted a comprehensive plan to meet the diversion requirements over 10 years. In 1995 the City of Calexico's diversion rate of 37%, which was board approved, indicated that the City of Calexico was successfully implementing its long term goals. During the past three years a number of events have occurred which have positively impacted the implementation of our long-term strategies. Our successes are a result of the following:

Formation of the Imperial Valley Waste Management Task Force, a joint powers agreement.

Participation in funding the 1992 SRRE plan by all eight Cities and the Imperial County

Construction of the Household Hazardous Waste Facility, which began operation on January 5, 2002.

Employment of fulltime staffing budgeted through 2006.

Employment of an educational consultant to present a comprehensive education program for grades 4 through 6.

Reallocation of the time of one of our solid-waste employees to include three hours per day of source reduction, reuse, and recycling activities.

Hiring Charles Tenborg of EcoSolutions to manage and operate the HHW facility.

Commercial cardboard pick up has been implemented.

Drop off center initiated.

Annual spring clean up conducted.

Grasscycling at public areas.

The City of Calexico and the other members of the Imperial Valley Waste Management Task Force are moving toward becoming a regional agency during 2002. Becoming a part of a regional agency will reinforce our efforts to meet the diversion requirements.
