Prior to 2000, South San Francisco Scavenger Company (Scavenger Company), our hauler, was in process of completing construction of a new state-of-the-art material recovery facility to replace the old, less efficient one we had been using for many years. The new facility commenced operation in January 2001 and ramped up to full production over the next few months. We have planned to expand our residential curbside and green waste programs, but needed the new MRF to process the materials (from South San Francisco and the other jurisdictions served by the Scavenger Company). The Scavenger Company is the hauler serving the regional area in the north county.

The programs we had planned in our SRRE were reasonable to achieve the diversion mandate. When we started implementing the programs we had a MRF that we believed would be adequate to process the materials we collected. During the mid-1990s, the Scavenger Company determined that the MRF needed to be upgraded to process materials more efficiently and expanded to allow new programs. In addition, we determined that prudent solid waste planning required that we include capacity to handle disaster debris.

Processing the materials from our commercial recycling programs has also been enhanced with the new MRF as we can evaluate a wet-dry collection system (focused on food waste) since we can now process those materials. We are also evaluating processing residential food and green waste collected commingled.

The time required under California environmental law and the local planning and public outreach requirements and processes delayed siting the new MRF until mid-1999. The MRF was constructed in a reasonable amount of time and brought on-line as the centerpiece of our strategy to achieve the diversion mandate.

A major change in the handling of the biosolids from the City's wastewater treatment plant was a major event that was not anticipated by the SRRE. When the SRRE was prepared, the biosolids had not been in the disposal stream, but were composted at a facility located in the city. That facility had to close due to development around it so the biosolids were sent for disposal. That action increased our disposal and reduced our diversion.

1. Limitations in the capacity of the containers used in the curbside program.

The 18-gallon containers used in the current residential curbside program do not have sufficient capacity. They do not allow for easy recycling of the volume of materials that could be recovered.

The new single-stream program that is planned will provide 64-gallons of split-can capacity for collection of fibers in one half and containers in the other. It will provide greater capacity and convenience to the resident and is expected to significantly increase diversion from the residential curbside program.

2. Lack of containers and the necessary collection program for residential green waste.

Green waste is currently collected in resident supplied containers. A new program will use 64 or 96-gallon containers supplied by the hauler and increased collection frequency from once every two weeks to once per week. The new program is expected to increase green waste collection by more than 30 percent, based on the experience in other San Mateo County cities.

3. Lack of processing capacity at the old MRF.

The MRF that was used until 2001 did not have the capacity to handle the type of materials or the volume that was needed. The new MRF that began operations in January 2001 has the capability to handle the new single-stream residential curbside program, to provide construction and demolition debris floor sorting, to grind wood waste and other materials for use as ADC, and to process materials from commercial recycling programs. The new facility was designed to accommodate the growth expected over the next 30 years.

4. Opportunities for more residential recycling.

The materials originally accepted in the residential curbside program were numbers 1 and 2 plastic, newspaper, cardboard, glass, aluminum, tin, and used oil. We expanded that program by adding mixed paper, junk mail, numbers 3 to 7 plastic beverage containers, magazines, and phone books.

5. Locating a new site to divert biosolids.

The effort to locate a site that could accept our biosolids and divert them for the entire year was time consuming. Some operators could accept those materials for a part of the year, but not the entire year. The operator we have contracted with can accept them for the entire year. That program was operational in July 2002.

6. Food waste composting.

We are evaluating a food waste composting program for both our commercial and residential customers. The new Base-Year recently approved includes identification of some commercial entities that may be good candidates for diverting food waste. In addition, we are aware of several large food waste generators. We will evaluate how that material might be collected in our situation and the anticipated volume of material. We are also planning to evaluate collection of vegetative food with the new green waste containers.

7. C&D ordinance.

We have the franchise for collecting debris boxes and we process that material through our new MRF. However, many construction companies use their own vehicles or hire trucking firms to haul C&D material. We are evaluating the need for an ordinance to encourage diversion of the C&D material to close loopholes in the management of this material.

8. Public education

We are always looking for ways to better inform the public about the diversion programs they can use and the importance of using them. The Scavenger Company is installing a new Education Center at the MRF to teach school groups and adult groups about the operation of the facility.

2. Why does your jurisdiction need the amount of time requested? Describe any relevant circumstances in the jurisdiction that contribute to the need for a Time Extension.

The effectiveness of the SRRE programs depended on having a MRF capable of handling the increased amounts of materials. The new programs will need approvals, which will take some time to receive. Also, obtaining the equipment needed requires time. The three years requested will enable all of these activities to be implemented and provide time for shakedown of the new programs.

The public outreach needed for such major changes also requires time and repetition to be effective. We have been providing ongoing public education and expect that the effort will need to be increased for a time to introduce the new curbside and green waste programs.

The primary factors contributing to the need for additional time are the delay inherent in the waste related permitting process in this state and the usual time it takes for municipalities to approve support for a new facility. Our MRF serves three jurisdictions and getting regulatory agency clearances took six years before the city councils could approve the project.

3. Describe your jurisdiction's Good Faith Efforts to implement the programs in its SRRE.

The PARIS forms that are attached summarize the City's efforts to implement the programs over the last six years. In addition to those efforts, the City has done the following things to strengthen the programs identified in the SRRE.

1. A new Base-Year has been approved for 2001, which gives the city a better understanding of the sources of diversion and confidence in the generation value.
2. The city has had a curbside program service since 1989, which accepted number 1 and 2 plastic, newspaper, glass, plastic, cardboard, and aluminum. The Scavenger Company also recycled things mattresses, wood, and other hard to handle materials.
3. The city has had a commercial recycling program since well before AB 939 was enacted. These programs provided a good base to build on.
4. Wood diversion programs were started in the mid-1980's.
5. The household hazardous started in the mid-1980's, when this material was not of regulatory interest. The Scavenger Company removes the material and reused it.
6. The new and larger MRF has had positive reviews from the community. This 100,000 square foot facility includes the space to handle debris from natural disasters.
7. We have had mandatory collection since well before AB 939 was enacted.
