

Every living thing needs a home.






Some homes are made of wood

This little bird is the California least tern.



The least tern eats small fish and small crabs. It walks around in the water looking for food.



The least tern must live in a place where it can find food and shelter.



The least tern makes a nest in the sand.
It lays its eggs in this nest.



The baby terns need a safe place to eat and sleep. They stay in the nest until they can walk.



Once they can walk, the baby terns go with their mother to find food near the nest.



When the days get cold, the least terns fly to a warmer place. When it gets warmer, the least terns come back to the sand to make new nests.



For some time, people have been watching the least terns.



Some terns have changed where they are making their homes.



In California, there are many roads close to the ocean. People use these roads every day. They go to work, and they go home again.



People like to visit the beaches in California, too. Some people build houses right on the beach.



That means it is getting harder for the California least terns to find shelter. They need quiet, sandy beaches to make their homes.
