




agriculture

Activities related to the production, distribution, and consumption of goods and services.




ecosystem goods


manufacturing

middle colonies




native species




The American colonies that included New York, New Jersey, Delaware, and Pennsylvania.

Plants, animals, and other organisms that are found naturally in a place.




natural resources

naturalist




Materials, such as water, minerals, energy, and soil, that people use from nature and natural systems.

A person who studies nature.




New England colonies

The American colonies that included Maryland, Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, and Georgia.





staple crop




An individual, group, or business that provides money or other support for a project.
